NEWS FROM ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH

The special Mothering Sunday service at 11.30 on 18 March provided an opportunity to welcome to the church many who are not 'regulars' at the usual 8.45 service. It was a joy to see the young children participating in some parts of the service. Most people judged the innovation to be a success, but we shall be looking at ways of developing and improving the service for next year.

The professional Theatre Roundabout production of 'Canterbury's Burning' on 24 March was a huge success. The play was the climax of 3 plays in each of the parishes of Lee, Morteheo and Woolacombe and the play in Lee was followed by a splendid supper. Although underwritten by the 3 churches, it was hoped to raise some funds for the Ilfracombe Poverty Action Group as well as providing professional theatre in the 3 villages. In fact, £550 was sent to IPAG. Enormous thanks are due to Janet Mayo and Sebastian Birch for their inspiration and organisation of the event and to many village people who helped in so many different ways.

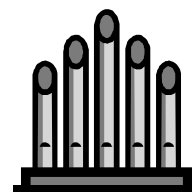
Holy Week and Easter soon followed the Theatre Roundabout. Services culminated in the Easter morning Communion service. The church was full and everyone enjoyed an uplifting service in the beautifully decorated church with the singing led by the usual willing volunteers in the choir. The Easter Monday coffee morning took place as usual the next day. Attendance was down a bit but all who came enjoyed their Hot Cross Bun with their drink!

It is now becoming almost a tradition to have additional flowers in church at the same time as the Arts and Crafts Exhibition takes place in the Memorial Hall. We hope to do the same this year from 28 July to 12 August so that visitors have an additional attraction. I also hope to arrange for a number of organists to play the church organ so that, for a time each afternoon, visitors can also listen to some music.

It won't be all that long before it is harvest festival time again! Last year's very successful Harvest Festival was designed to be an occasion for the whole village community to celebrate village life. We are intending that the service this year will follow similar lines with a few modifications. It will, of course, be followed by the usual excellent supper in the Memorial Hall at which considerable quantities of food and drink seem to get consumed very easily! So, reserve the date now – Sunday 16 September at 6.30 pm.

As always, thanks to the kindness of Carol Porton, who runs the craft shop, the church is always open to visitors when the craft shop is open. Everyone is most welcome to visit the church when it is open. Carol's lease on the old school room comes to an end in December and she has indicated that she is unlikely to renew it. As you will see from a separate announcement, the Parochial Church Council would welcome any expressions of interest in leasing the old school room from 2008 onwards. 'Combe' is a frequent place name in Devon, meaning a steep sided valley. So both Lincombe and Combelynchet mean a cultivated terrace at the top of the valley.

We are sorry to report the death on 14 May of Neil Hamilton, formerly of Highfield House. Neil was born in Bradford in 1920. He was a civil engineer by profession and worked all over the world from the Bahamas to Saudi Arabia. However, Lee was his base for all his married life. His wife, Anne, died about 15 years ago. I am now 85, but these memories will remain. My two children (now adults, of course) quite often come out with a tale or two of something that happened when they spent their summer holidays at Lee.

Incidentally, we are all convinced that there is a ghost or some kind of spirit roaming about, particularly at night!

LEE & LINCOMBE RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION 2007 AGM REPORT

The Chairman, Paul Thom, welcomed 42 members to the 40th AGM of the Association, which would be his last in the Chair. In his address, the Chairman reported a successful first year for the Japanese Knotweed Sub-Committee. He then commented on the 2 licensing applications by the Lee Bay Hotel during the past year - the first last September (under the old management) against which the Association objected to mainly on the grounds of noise. The Licensing Committee Hearing placed quite onerous conditions on the hotel's licence. Following the sale of the hotel in February and a Village Meeting at which the new management explained their plans for the future, a second licensing application was made in March to remove these onerous conditions. This time the Association did not object mainly on the grounds of giving the new management time to make the changes they wanted. As there were objectors to the application, a Hearing should be held later this month.

The Chairman then commented on the new lower speed limits introduced last November of 20 mph in Lee village and 30 mph in Lincombe and down the hill to The Grange. Despite Highways saying the signs are 'in accordance with the regulations', the Association has written and complained about the unsuitable location of many of the signs. We await their response. The Chairman thanked the retiring Committee, the Secretary and Treasurer for their dedicated work and support during the past year. Special thanks were due to Colin Wright who was retiring from the Committee on his election to the District Council. The Chairman concluded by thanking everyone helping with the Britain in Bloom display.



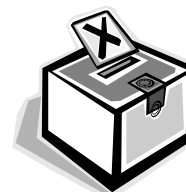

The Treasurer reported a £106 profit for the year which shows a substantial improvement over the previous year as a result of the subscription increase and a greater number of subscriptions collected. The Flower Show Committee was thanked for a £60 donation towards the flower displays in the village. On the Knotweed side, a £2,485 surplus was reported for the first full year of operation which was due to £6,000 of grants received from the AONB Sustainable Development Fund and North Devon District Council, to both of which we are extremely grateful. The Secretary, Gina Hilborne, gave her report on various matters dealt with by the Committee during the year. Besides 12 planning applications reviewed, other matters included the public toilets on the lane to the seafront, the seafront car park, sea wall and slipway damage by heavy seas and flooding on Lee Road. The summary minutes are posted on the Lee website. The Secretary ended by thanking the Chairman for his dedicated work during the past 6 years. Following a number of questions, both reports were adopted.

Mavis Rogers then gave an informative report on the Japanese Knotweed Sub-Committee's first full year of operation, which had received very favourable comments on its work from the AONB (from which body the grant was received) and the Environment Agency (which gives permission for the use of chemicals).

The annual subscription to £4 per household was approved. As 8 nominations had been received for the 7 Committee vacancies, a ballot was held under the supervision of Bob Gilliat and Mavis Rogers. Whilst the ballot was being counted, Councillor

Fowler spoke on various matters raised in a letter from the Committee – road signs and flooding dealt with by Highways at County level, and car park and toilets dealt with at District level. Councillor Fowler then answered the many questions of the members present. The result of the ballot was then announced (see below) announcing those being elected to your new Committee. There being no further business, the Chairman declared the AGM closed. Wine and cheese and refreshments were served to all members.

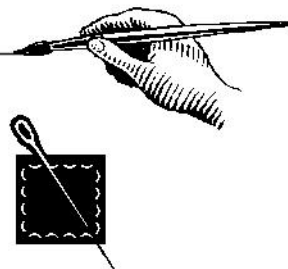

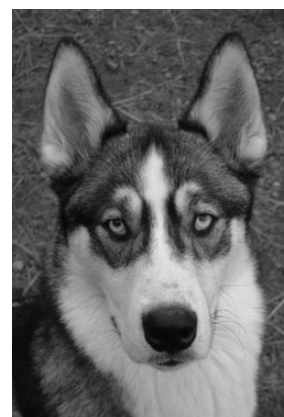

LEE'S SIBERIAN HUSKY TEAM UPDATE

As I've said before, huskies are not a typical breed - they need lots of attention, other huskies for company - and even more fencing. Many huskies end up in unsuitable homes, escape or are let off the lead, only to be injured on the roads or (quite justifiably) by farmers. Therefore it is always fitting that the 2006/7 race season is precluded by a weekend for the public in aid of Husky Welfare, held annually in Colwyn Bay. Being one of the lucky ones herself, we decided that Lulu (pictured right) should be entered into the Best Sled-dog Welfare class at the dog show. Out of about 40 rescued huskies, malamutes and other sled-dog breeds from across the UK, Lulu's incredible recovery from being found near-death from starvation and malnutrition on the streets of Warwickshire at Christmas in 2005 into a most affectionate and energetic racing machine must have tugged on the judge's heart strings and she took the trophy! She even managed to beat the adorable 'Two Toes', a dog rescued and rehomed after being shot in the foot, and a poor dog (now rehomed) that was taken by its clueless owners to the vet as a 12 week old puppy to be euthanised for 'aggression'. We understand from the breed club that this welfare event has become very popular and may now become two events, with one in Somerset, so this would be the most local event for anyone interested in meeting more of these beautiful creatures.



From late October 2006 to March 2007 Lulu went on to compete in races across the UK, from Scotland to the New Forest. Usually running in a 2-dog formation with our 3 year-old Mea (the red one), they ended up 4th overall in the 2-dog class. Their best performance was at Thruxton Raceway (pictured) when they came second. Lulu was 'talent-spotted' at a race and was invited to go on a Christmas training run in Somerset with one of the top race kennels. She easily raced alongside the very fastest huskies in the country and the owners told us that she would complement any of the best teams.

We also ran another team this past season, this time made up of Malo (previously introduced here as newly rehomed Quinn - we changed his name to reflect his new life) and Kiki (the alpha of the pack). Unfortunately, as predicted, the brains, brawn and general willingness to get off the sofa were all used up in the other team. Malo and Kiki charged off the start line, flew past banks of photographers, and then decided it was a lovely morning for sniffing the flowers and generally taking it easy! Their best performance was probably at Sherwood Forest (pictured right) when the event photographer only managed to get three photos of them as they trotted past him - usually he'd have time to take at least four! This shot was taken just after they had rolled up their picnic blanket!



Now on their summer break, the huskies are taken off their high protein and high fat diets in order to keep them cool and calm in the hot weather. They are usually found chewing on homemade ice blocks in the garden or having a cool dip down at Lee Bay.

Lee Bay is somewhere that I will always long for, a very special place.

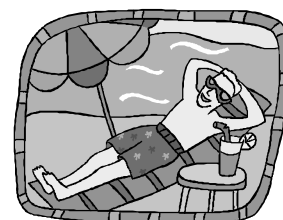

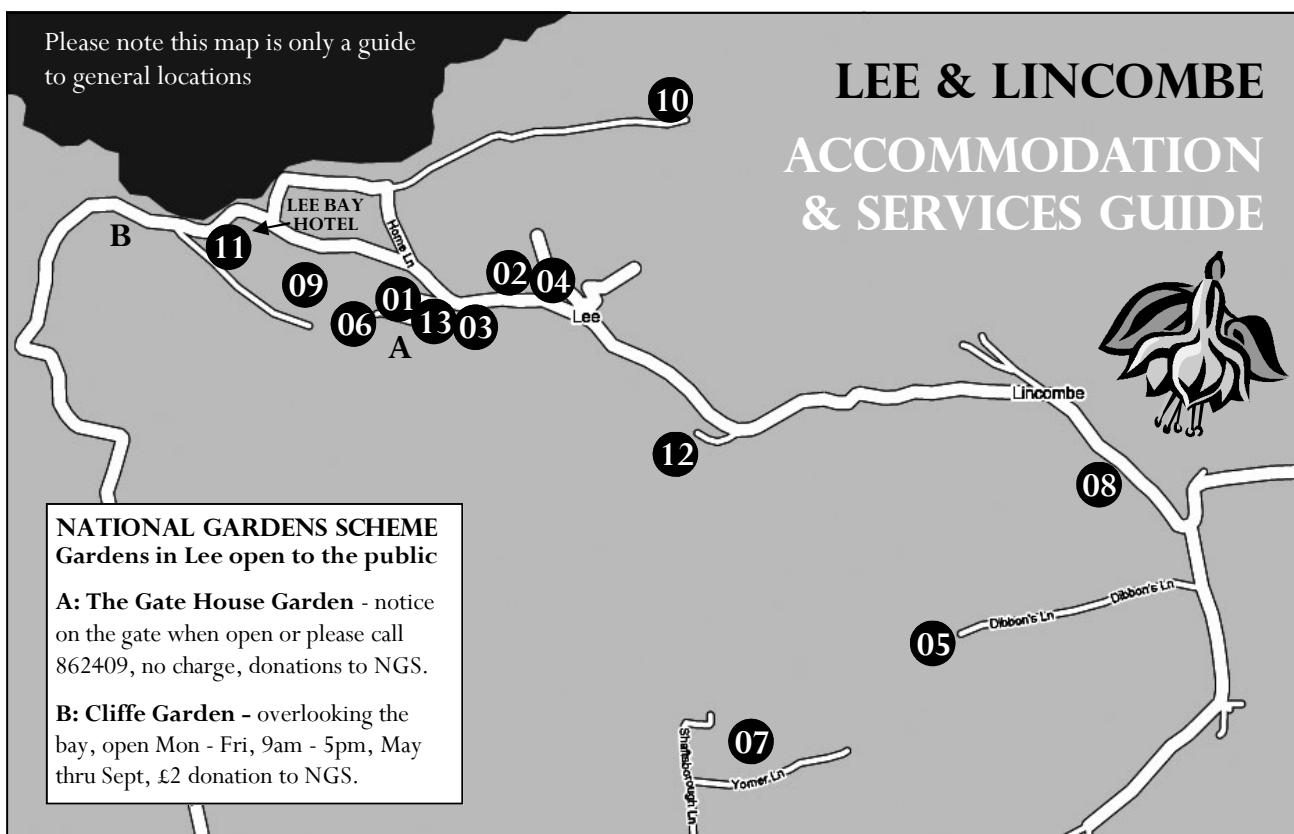
