
Jennifer intend to

#### News from St. Matthew's Church

There's a lot to report for this edition of the Lee and Link'em News! Firstly, to start where I finished last time. We are delighted that Fran Larcombe took over the lease of the Old Schoolroom on 1 January from Carol Porton. Fran and her husband, Steve, live near Umberleigh at present, though they hope they may be able to move closer to Lee at some time in the future. Fran is an artist and intends to use the Old Schoolroom as her studio and as a gallery for herself and other local artists. It will be known as 'The Fuchsia Gallery'. She also intends to sell a range of locally made crafts so that there will be plenty to attract local people and visitors to the Old Schoolroom. It is very good that we shall have this attraction in the village carrying on where Carol left off, but in a somewhat different direction. Please give Fran every support and encouragement in her new venture.

Christmas is now some time ago but happy memories of the two special services in the church linger. The village carol service was a splendid occasion with nearly 120 people packed into the church to enjoy a very varied service with contributions from the handbell ringers, the Lee singers, several readers and a dozen or so children who gave a delightful presentation of the nativity. The service was followed by a most enjoyable social gathering with mulled wine and mince pies in the Memorial Hall, kindly arranged and provided by the Hall committee. The Christmas Communion on Christmas Eve was a lovely, dignified service in the beautiful candlelit church. The church was full and the singing was led by a splendid choir.

Thoughts now turn to special occasions this year. The first of these is Mothering Sunday on Sunday 2 March. There will be a Family Service in the church at 11.30am, instead of the usual service at 8.45am. The service is being carefully planned to appeal to people of all ages, including children, and there will be opportunities for many people to be involved in the service. The service will use modern language and those who wish to take communion will be able to do so. Before the service, from 10.45am onwards, tea, coffee, soft drinks and biscuits will be served in the Memorial Hall. Do come along to celebrate mothers and families everywhere!

Easter is very early this year — Easter Sunday is 23 March, only one day later than the earliest it can be. As usual, there will be special services on Good Friday and Easter Sunday. A service of readings, prayers and hymns to commemorate Christ's crucifixion will be held at 2.00 pm on Good Friday 21 March. Then we expect the church to be full for a joyful celebration of Easter at the communion service at 9.00am Sunday 23 March when the singing will be led by the choir. Everyone is most welcome at these services. On Easter Monday, there will be a coffee morning in the Memorial Hall starting at 10.00 am with hot cross buns to go with drinks and there will also be a cake stall.

Sunday 27 April is Rogation Sunday. Traditionally, in villages over the country, people went round the village boundaries, 'beating the bounds' to mark the land belonging to the village. No one is aware that this has been done in Lee, but, for a number of years, people from the 3 parishes of Lee, Mortehoe and Woolacombe have gone on a relatively short walk that has covered a bit of each of the parishes. We have had a picnic at Damage Barton which is in Lee parish. Details of this year's walk have still to be arranged, but everyone is most welcome to join in the walk that normally starts from the Mortehoe car park at noon. Watch out for further information.

#### NEWS FROM ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH CONTD.

A group of people from the 3 parishes is looking at the arrangements we make for baptisms or christenings. The aim is to encourage parents of young children to have them baptised and also to encourage older people, who were not baptised when very young, to come forward. If you would like to consider being baptised or have (or will have) babies or young children for whom you might like to consider baptism, please contact the Vicar, Giles King-Smith, at Woolacombe Vicarage (870467) or speak to any church officers at St Matthew's Church.

In an earlier article in the Lee and Link'em News, I mentioned the Quinquennial Survey (every 5 years) that is undertaken at all Church of England churches. Ours took place in October and we have been waiting the outcomes with some trepidation. We have been aware for some time that major work will be needed on the church sooner or later, particularly at the back of the church where the rose window is in poor condition and dampness is of great concern. The interior decoration is also deteriorating quickly now. We have been relieved to know that the architect's report is not all gloom and doom! Little that we didn't already know about was revealed. However, it is very clear that, over the next few years, many thousands of pounds will have to be spent on major restoration work so that the church remains for future generations. The Church Council is giving its attention to what will need doing and when, and how it will set about the fundraising that will be necessary. We are very aware of the urgent need to upgrade the Memorial Hall as well, and it is very important that the Church Council works in close liaison with the Hall Committee over the timing of necessary work and of fundraising implications for both of us. We shall try to keep everyone fully informed of developments as they occur.

#### LETTER FROM FRANCE

It is now, though hard to believe, three years since we moved to France from Lee Bay. For that reason this will be my last letter to the Lee and Link'Em News, as I am sure many new people have arrived and many left and things move along and we are well and truly part of the past and not the present in Devon. But the time really has gone so very fast it's quite scary, so that I still feel very much a newcomer to these parts despite the fact that I have helped no end of people find their feet here as they have arrived after me.

This year alone four English couples have moved into the area since staying in our B&B and deciding this was the area for them. They have regularly been on the phone to me asking for all sorts of things; where to buy the best power tools, who to see about the car registration, how much are we paying for our logs or can I recommend a good plumber etc. I feel like an old timer as I dispense help and advice but in my heart I still feel very much in awe of living in this familiar but different country. So I thought I'd try to explain the most obvious differences between here and Devon!

Firstly, where we are is most decidedly rural, so that in itself isn't so different. Our department has one town of 20,000 people, that is Auch, the prefecture, and the other towns are all less than 8,000. There is no rural bus service, virtually no train network, no industry and no motorway in the whole department of the Gers. I have a supermarket exactly seven miles away in Plaisance, where there is also a pharmacie, two boulangeries, a tabac, paper shop and a couple of estate agents, plus a bar and a hotel. Oh, and a small DIY store.

If I want a proper shopping experience, akin say to Barnstaple, I must drive for 1 hour. But of course I must remember that the shops close at lunchtime. All shops except a very large supermarket are closed from 12 to 2.30 or 3pm. Learning to get up very early and leave all your morning jobs until the afternoon in order to get shopping done before 12 takes a great deal of practice.

Which leads on to the concept of lunchtime here. This being rural France, of course everything stops for lunch. Eating is and has been historically a public event in France. People eat in restaurants a lot and working men, be they builders or farmers, will rarely be seen with sandwiches. Even if they have to drive, they will try to eat lunch in a cafe or restaurant. Even in the back of a garage a small card table will be laid with a cloth and greasy working men will sit down to eat and chat for a good long time.

The food is always good quality and delicious but very traditional here in the countryside. The UK can easily rival France now in the variety of the food it serves, but still not in the good fresh wholesome cooking that is affordable to all. Here the point of eating at lunchtime is as much about the experience of 'lunch time' as the eating. The sitting, talking, resting, debating, relaxing. This is where I've noticed a big difference. The finest sandwiches could never compete with a table and good company. In fact snacking or eating on the hoof is so rare here that I have actually had people wish me a 'bon appetit' simply when they have seen me eating a packet of crisps standing up! You never see eating in the streets, there's a very limited variety of chocolate bars for sale in the tabac, and apart from McDonalds an hour away, there are no takeaways except the pizza van that does the rounds of the local villages once a week. This makes for very litter-free streets and slim people!

If it sounds as if people in rural France know how to relax, you would do well to bear that in

mind when you're standing behind someone in a shop. The person being served will have all the attention until he is a truly satisfied customer, and then, after briefly discussing the health of the family, the assistant will move on. You learn to be very patient when you are the person standing behind, and then you remember that you can be patient because you're not in a rush anyway. No one seems to be. I know we live in a rural area, and stress is less, as in North Devon, but I have never in all my time here seen anyone serving in a shop look stressed because they have a long queue of customers. If they have, they just look up at it, look down again and get on with the job.

That said, woe betide you if you walk into a shop at 5 minutes to midday! We had been here only a few weeks and I was browsing the local DIY store when the assistant in his brown coat approached the end of the aisle. I heard him call 'Madame' and looked up. I said briefly that I didn't need any help thank you, at which point he lifted his left wrist and tapped gently but pointedly on his watch face. I didn't make that mistake again.

The roads, of course, are a delight to drive on as anyone who regularly comes over to France knows. They are well signed, well maintained and very quiet. I can at this point add that the hospitals are as excellent as is claimed. Richard needed stitches to his chin and neck the other day so this was accompanied by a tetanus jab, brain scan, blood test, x-ray and the attention, in rotation, of some 4 or 5 doctors, numerous nurses, then an overnight stay in his own en suite room. And no, we were not private patients.

Of course there are just as many problems here really, just different ones I guess. Jean Claude who rents some land from us was bemoaning the way he has not been able to get a good price for his veal calves in Italy this year due to the massive worldwide hike on cereal prices. We still had a 4 hour wait in A & E before Richard's treatment, due in part to the Emergency Doctors and Nurses going on strike for better equipment and medicines. But all in all, North Devon or South of France, it's not a bad life is it?

Have a great 2008.

#### LEE MEMORIAL HALL COMMITTEE

Mud, mud, glorious mud! The muddy part of the meadow is the area being prepared for the erection of the play equipment after planning approval was granted. This will be followed by the sowing of grass seed and hedge planting. We are now waiting for the area to drain after the latest long period of rain before the special matting is laid. The excavation work will also help with the drainage of the field. Another wildflower area is going to be excavated. During the works the meadow may be closed to the public, notices will be posted on the access gates.

In January the first village meadow fuchsia hedge cutting day was very successful and made short work of the pruning. Mulled wine, homemade soup and a roll were enjoyed by the volunteers in the hall. Our thanks to all those who participated. It is hoped that this will become an annual event.

Just before Christmas we heard from the Big Lottery Fund that we had failed in our bid to secure funding to renovate our Memorial Hall. When we contacted them they told us that the only reason we were unsuccessful was because of the lack of returns of the questionnaire from the hall committee to villagers in comparison to other bidders. It indicated to them a "degree of apathy within the village to carry through such a large project".

We now only have 18 months left of the original two years that the Environmental Health officer gave us to upgrade our kitchen and toilets to meet new regulations. The original architect plans are being altered to show the minimum amount of work needed to be done to keep the hall open. Estimates for this work will then be sought. The Hall Committee will be applying for other funding as it becomes available and to this end we will be sending out a new questionnaire which will need the wholehearted support of everyone if we are to be successful.

The Committee have reorganised and redistributed the hall work that needed to be done over the year, this included implementing a new hall booking system which is more customer friendly. Kate Seekings has taken over the bookings for hiring the hall, tel: 867068. The booking charges have been reassessed and increased in line with rising fuel, electricity, and maintenance costs. A list of those responsible for the various jobs will be on display in the village hall.

We have been lucky enough to have been given a metal outside storage shed bought with grant money allocated to the Mini Monsters.

As most grant money needs to be match funded it is essential for the hall committee to fund raise for the hall renovations. This started in January with a Cockney Quiz Night. The tickets were all sold and  $\pounds62.70$  was raised from a most enjoyable evening to kick start the fund.

The number of people living permanently in the hall catchment area of Lee and Lincombe and surrounds is dwindling because there are more second/holiday homes than ever before. It is becoming increasingly difficult for the committee to get help to run the hall events and therefore fund raise for the work to be done. I am therefore making a special appeal to all those second/holiday home owners to plan their trips to the village so they can help their

friends and neighbours who live permanently in the villages with the fund raising events that will enable us to keep our village hall.

The next fund raiser is cream teas and refreshments in the hall over the Easter holidays Friday 21st to Monday 24th March 1 pm to 5 pm. This will be followed by the medieval theme Spring Fayre on 26th May. We will do cream teas again in the summer. The Arts and Craft Sale and Exhibition is from 1st to 17th August. Help is needed from everyone for all these events. We are not ageist or sexist! If we do not manage to get enough help then you will be proving the Big Lottery Fund assessors right and apathy reigns in Lee and Lincombe. 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#### MINI MONSTERS PLAY GROUP



Mini Monsters parent and toddler group celebrated its 1st anniversary last November and promises to continue as a successful parent and toddler group well into the future with its small but loyal number of regulars and the rumours of more village children arriving in 2008!

Events over the last few months have included a number of visits from the Sure Start Toy Library with their extensive collection of the bigger and

more unusual toys that they have at their disposal, as well as a session with a local music teacher where the children engaged in some exercises in rhythm and song.

However, the highlight of 2007 must have been the visit of Father Christmas. This was all the more surprising for some of the children as they had already seen him earlier in the day at a number of different venues. Somehow he managed to squeeze Lee Village Hall onto his already packed itinerary much to the delight of the children who happily accepted his

presents – bar one little girl who needed considerable maternal counselling for trauma induced by the sight of this large, red-clad bearded fellow. Santa left to rapturous cheers and galloped off to the North Devon General where his best elf was due to receive treatment for an industrial injury to her wrists. We are extremely grateful to Santa for this unscheduled stop.

We are now incredibly well resourced as a group with everything from

puppets, to dressing up clothes, to musical instruments to all manner of lovely craft materials. Once again we invite any villager who'd like to spend a while with the children, perhaps making something with them or telling them a story, to get in touch — or just turn up at one of the sessions. We have recently purchased a number of outdoor toys, such as 'pop-up' goals, as well as indoor toys, such as a short tennis net, which will be appropriate for use by a wide age range of children. Surprisingly perhaps, there were at a recent count, 35 resident children under 16 in the villages of Lee & Lincombe. Add to this about 34 children in the families of second-home owners and it seems the youth population is burgeoning. We hope to organise some outdoor games when the weather gets warmer and invite children of any age to join us. 

I look forward to the pleasure of your company.



#### LEE'S SIBERIAN HUSKY TEAM UPDATE

A number of Lee and Lincombe residents will already have met the latest addition to the Lee Siberian Husky pack. Little Nina (pictured right, with big 'sister' Lulu) came to us in December as an abandoned 4 month-old puppy thrown out on the streets of Hampshire. In spite of such a sad start, she is a very healthy and balanced little girl. Who knows how she ended up in that awful situation at such a tender age?

She has slotted straight in without a hitch and spends her days watching and playing with her four brothers and sisters, learning how to behave. The pack mentality is such that we have hardly had to step in at all. She has just started some light training in harness at 6 months old and she shows great promise as a runner, we might have a really fast team yet!

In January we headed north to Aviemore in the Scottish Highlands to once again take part in the biggest sled-dog race in Europe. Kiki had been retired from the team, essentially due to sheer laziness, and so we entered her in the freight test. She surprised everyone by doing very well indeed, pulling a heavy trolley for 15 feet, and making it into the third round.

#### 1962 ADRIFT ALL NIGHT



I remember the incident reported in the Autumn edition of the Lee and Lincombe News of the fishing party saved after a nightmare drift.

It happened on the night of Saturday 1st September and they were rescued at about eight o'clock the next morning. The boat they were in belonged to my father and was about twelve feet long. Larry Watkins was our chef at the hotel, Jim Bennison worked in the still room, he came from Rochdale and, I believe was in his second season with us at the hotel; his wife was with him and was employed as a chambermaid. Gloria Hyes was one of many students who worked at the hotel during their breaks from university. The boy, 16 year old Tony Joseph was staying with his family at the hotel.



At about 6.30 on Sunday morning, I was woken by my mother who was worried that she could not find Chef or Jim . "I don't think they have come back from

their fishing trip" she said. I jumped out of bed, dressed quickly and checked the place where the boat was usually kept. Not finding it, I ran to check the beach, again drawing a blank. I returned to the hotel and told my father who phoned the police.

They called out the lifeboat and the rescue helicopter from Chivenor. Meanwhile I had run over to the Smugglers Cafe to get my brother Malcolm. Together we launched our boat and headed down channel. We were half way across Rockham Bay , the other side of the lighthouse, when the helicopter arrived, hovering above us. We indicated we were searching and tried to get them to search towards Morte Point, but they must have seen something out to sea for they turned away from us and went back toward Ilfracombe. By this time the sea was getting up a bit so we decided to search back towards Lee but further out. About five minutes after we had turned around we noticed the helicopter had started to hover and then we saw a figure being lowered towards the sea.

We could not see much as they appeared to be miles away from us, but when the lifeboat arrived at the spot we felt sure they had been found. I suppose they were about three miles out to sea. Chef, Gloria and Tony were ferried ashore in the Helicopter and landed in the field below Southcliffe. Jim was nervous about going in the helicopter, "you won't get me in one of those things" and elected to go in the lifeboat which also took the boat in tow to Ilfracombe harbour.


Everyone is welcome and as always we will be collecting annual subscriptions from residents prior to the start of the meeting, who will then be eligible to vote during the meeting.
