
GREETINGS AND FAREWELLS

LEE & LINCOMBE RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION

Over the last 12 months your Residents' Association Committee has been involved with many issues affecting our village and the Committee has all worked very hard on your behalf to resolve these, with the interests of Lee and Lincombe our main concern. We are now in our 44th year and dedicated to upholding the traditional values of this unique village. We can only achieve this with the support of the residents. These are some of the many issues that we have dealt with in 2010/2011:

POTHOLES. This is an ongoing problem with the Highways Dept. especially given the last two extremely cold winters. The potholes have been repaired no less than 3 times since December 2010 and quite promptly too.

PLOUGHING OF ROADSIDE, GRITTING BOXES. Gritting boxes are refilled when empty in response to a phone call and extra bags of grit were distributed where needed. Ploughing took place in March to clear debris from roadsides. Unfortunately not as good a job as in the old days, when done by hand with men and shovels. Change is not always for the best.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS. The Committee has dealt with 29 planning applications in the last 12 months. These can be accessed on the website, we believe this amount to be the highest number ever in one year.

UPKEEP OF PUBLIC TOILETS. Ilfracombe Town Council subsidizes the cost of cleaning, maintenance, etc., from April to October and the Residents' Association finance the upkeep for the remainder of the year, keeping the toilets open at weekends only at a cost of between £400/£500.

PUBLIC FOOTPATH THROUGH CHAPEL COTTAGE. The Residents' Association arranged for the resurfacing of the footpath in May this year.

LEE BAY HOTEL. The latest news on the hotel is that the development will not take place this year and will be delayed at least until 2012 due to lack of investment.

OLD MAIDS COTTAGE. This is likely to go ahead shortly, we have spoken to the new owner who is very keen to get started.

Your Committee will continue to carry out the Association's objectives on your behalf, to promote and safeguard the amenities of Lee & Lincombe. There is still one vacancy on the Committee should anyone be interested in joining us. We have had a very good response to the paying of subscriptions this year, which is very pleasing given the drain on our funds by the Public Toilets. If you have not paid your subscription yet, you can still do so, to the Secretary, Carolyn Weekes at Rose Cottage (01271 863257) or go online or set up a standing order. Details are on the website (www.leeandlincombe.org.uk).



A whimsical delight.


The dust free air's translucent,

More than 8000 people in Devon have already chosen to join up to www.carsharedevon.com and the scheme is particularly useful in rural areas with limited bus services.

One happy carsharedevon.com member has written "Living in Exmouth and working in Ashburton I was driving a little over 1000 miles a month and even with an LPG powered car the costs were taking their toll on my finances. Car sharing with three others has reduced my monthly mileage to around 300 which has reduced my costs and the wear and tear on my car. With one of the group also living in Exmouth there are days when my car does not move off the drive at all. Using the Carshare Devon website has saved me a fortune on fuel, servicing and (because of the reduced annual mileage) my insurance." Dave

Local Marie Curie Cancer Care supporter, Bridget Viney, is getting ready for her annual Blooming Great Tea Party.




