OUR HERO BLOOD DONOR

Very modestly during a recent conversation, Rob James, of Whitestone Cleave, slipped out the information that he has just given his 100th pint of blood. In recognition of this tremendous achievement, Rob has received an engraved crystal trophy form the Blood Transfusion Service. We send Rob our congratulations and thanks for this life-saving commitment.

Rob says that it was while he was working for the Fire Service that he was asked if he would consider becoming a blood donor. It was on 17 September 1963 that he gave his first pint of blood at Wickford

in Essex. 59 years later, in

November 2012, Rob donated his 100th pint here in Ilfracombe. He has given blood on a regular basis, apart from a short break in the early 1970s. When he first gave blood you could only give two pints a year. However, things have changed and you can now give every 14 weeks. The age of 70 was previously the limit for blood donors, but now, providing you have given regularly, you can continue after you have reached the age of 70. Rob says it has taken him a long time to reach 100 pints, but it is only a matter of about 10 hours a year – not very long for such a worthy cause.

On Saturday and Sunday May 4th and 5th Louise and Daisy Passmore raised a fantastic £165.16 at their bake sale held at The Old Schoolroom Craft Gallery in Lee. 2013 AGM: Chairman's Report (Eric Couling)

I would first like to thank all the committee members for their work over the last year, and Paul Thom for being Treasurer. During the course of the year the committee has dealt with many issues that have affected our village. These are just some.

Potholes

As you all know these are an ongoing problem and have only recently been repaired once again.

Ploughing

The ploughing of the roadside verges took place in September last year at the request of the LLRA.

Hedges

The cutting of the hedges in the village took place during October, this was not easy as we had to obtain all the addresses of the owners and ask their permission and arrange contractors to do the work. Many thanks to Peter Bostock for working in conjuction with Bill Banting, the Highways engineer, for getting all the information and arranging this.

Community Seat

Andy Wislocki has volunteered to re-paint & re-varnish as necessary, the Community Seat. Denny, the designer & constructor of that seat, is particularly grateful to him for taking an interest & care in it. The seat's comfort & perfect position on Elizabeth Gilliat's land overlooking the valley, is much appreciated by visitors to Lee, en route down or up Home Lane.

Beach Causeway and Slipway

The state of the causeway and slipway has been of great concern for some time. A large section of the slipway wall had come away and fallen on to the beach. This has now been removed and the wall repaired and the causeway repaired both sides. The tap on the beach wall had been leaking for some time. The NDDC has arranged for its replacement.

Lee Meadow Farm

There have been many complaints about the application for planning permission to erect a property for an agricultural worker's dwelling on this site. The LLRA has been working in conjunction with neighbours and Mortehoe parish council to oppose this. Both this committee and Mortehoe parish council have put in objections and, at present, this is still in the consultation period. No decision has yet been made.






LEE & LINCOMBE RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION CONTD.

Lee Bay Hotel

Still no further news with regards to re-development. Mr David Higgins is not the owner - he is a property speculator. The owner is Mr John Chesterman of Chesterman Consultants of London. This committee made a complaint to the Highways Dept. about the state of the wall opposite Mill House. Highways has now written to Mr Chesterman to advise him that the wall is about to fall over and could cause an accident.





AGM 2013: Secretary's Report (Carolyn Weekes)

The Committee has met 4 times over the past year and dealt with 9 Planning Applications. Only 2 warranted strong objections from the Committee, these being "Old Maids Cottage", erection of double garage/workshop with living accommodation over, and "Lee Meadow Farm", erection of agricultural workers dwelling. The "Old Maids Cottage" application was withdrawn and as yet there is no decision on "Lee Meadow Farm". "Old Maids Cottage" has recently put in another application for a double garage which will have to be discussed anew.

The Chairman has already reported on all the other village initiatives that the Committee have been involved with over the past year so no need to say any more.

Sadly at the beginning of the year we lost a very good friend of the Residents Association with the death of Colin Wright. A very sad time for the village Colin did a great deal in his time as Councillor, looking after the interests of Lee and Lincombe. Both Colin and Biggy are missed by their many friends in Lee and the surrounding area.

Peter Bostock, a very valued Committee Member has now left us. Peter and Jill have moved to Braunton to be nearer the golf course. Peter worked very hard on any task he undertook for the Association, keeping an eye on potholes, flooding and most other highway matters. So thank you Peter, you will be sadly missed.

Finally, we have vacancies on the Committee and always welcome new members, so if there is anybody out there who is not already on a village committee (there must be someone, somewhere) please make yourself known to us.



AGM 2013: Japanese Knotweed Report (Mavis Rogers)

- 1. We continue with the control of J.K. as agreed with the environment agency.
- 2. This season is proving difficult due to weather conditions, but are hopeful we will complete the Spring treatment in time
- 3. We continue to train additional sprayers, and have divided up treatment areas allocating these to individuals, in consequence each sprayer becomes familiar with their area.
- 4. We are also gradually handing back treatment to local land owners, so reducing the team's workload. Where this is not possible the team will continue treatment.
- 5. We have had a very helpful discussion with the new team at Southcliffe Hall.
- 6. The grant from Defra is proving very helpful, but is rigorously monitored!!
- 7. We have had difficulty insuring our team this year, and in consequence may need to set up a separate bank account.

Those of us who have worked for years on the project and/or are getting very old (for me, climbing a style or a five bar gate is not a pretty sight!) are gradually handing control to younger and/or newly trained sprayers. This enables experience to be passed on, and ensures a satisfactory conclusion to the project.

I would like to thank all the volunteers who quietly work so hard on the project, and are ensuring our valley continues to be a haven for plant and wildlife.

Well known People who have visited Lee (21-30)

Another instalment of our serialisation of the well known people who have visited Lee over the years.

(21) JUDGE OMEROD was having a holiday in the 1950s at The Lee Bay Hotel. I remember a very old man, who had a great deal of trouble finding his room.

The LANGHAMS, (22) ANTHONY and (23) MYRTLE, wrote extensively on Lundy, the island in the Bristol Channel, and stayed several times with Bob Gilliat and his wife Elizabeth. One time when on his way to stay with the Gilliats, Anthony was taken ill. The rescue helicopter was out most of the day, before he was found on Exmoor.



(24) SIR ROBERT MARK used to stay at The Haven in about 1985. He was the head of the Metropolitan Police at the time. He was born 13 March and died quite recently, on 30 September 2010.

(25) WILLIAM ALLEN JOWITT, first Earl Jowett PC.KC, was born 15 April 1885 and died 16 August 1957. He was a Labour politician and served as Lord Chancellor for the country under Clement Atlee from 1945 till 1951. He often stayed at the White House.

While talking to Peter Richey for this article, he happened to mention that he thought that the pop singer (26) DAVE BERRY had stayed at Grey Cottage, the West family's old home. DAVE BERRY was born on the 6 February 1941, as David Holgate Grundy.

(27) PRINCE CHARLES came, if not to the heart of Lee, to its outer limits, in May 28 1992, to Borough Farm, the home of Mr and Mrs Irving Kennard and their son, David, owner of Mist the sheepdog which has umpteen stars to his name for starring in the TV show. The Prince gave a speech on conserving water, and could hardly be heard for the rain drumming on the tent in which he was speaking.

(28) ROY LANCASTER O.B.E. V.M., the well known TV personality, is the next person on the list. He visited Lee in 2000, while in the process of making a TV programme, in the Gardener's World Series. He was born in 1937 and is a broadcaster and gardener.

(29) CHRISTOPHER GEORGE PACKHAM, CHRIS PACKHAM was on the beach at Lee during October 2011, searching through rock pools for the TV programme Autumn Watch. He was born 4 May 1961, and is a naturalist and TV presenter. He and his friend (30) MATT BAKER, who is also a naturalist and TV presenter, was born MATTHEW JAMES BAKER on 23 December 1977. He married Nicola Mooney at Whinstone in Teesdale in 2004, and now has a son Luke and a daughter Molly Scarlett.

LEE MEMORIAL HALL UPDATE



The weather forecast for Bank Holiday Monday, 27 May, said it would start raining at 1.00 pm. At 12.59 pm the rain started and it got heavier and heavier, and so it continued throughout the Spring Fair and well into the evening! But we followed that familiar phrase 'Keep calm and carry on'. Thanks to the superb efforts by all the



helpers and the stoicism of the great British public, the Fair was very successful. Financially the results were down by about £900, but the Fair raised a remarkable £2,263, including donations from a number of people who were unable to be present. I hope that sufficient thanks to everyone concerned have already been expressed, but, as Hall Chairman, I should like to emphasise my gratitude to the sub-committee who spent time over many months organising the Fair, to everyone who so generously donated things for the Fair, to those who helped set up beforehand, to all the helpers on the day and to the brilliant team who dismantled everything and put things away mainly on Tuesday after the rain had stopped. I think the Spring Fair is a splendid achievement for our very small community. On the day, for example, there were 26 stalls and other attractions and 54 helpers. It is all this commitment that

makes the Fair successful and brings in visitors from a wide area.



The next big event is the Arts and Crafts Exhibition which starts on Saturday 27 July and continues until Sunday 11 August. It will follow the familiar pattern of 3 main attractions — the arts and crafts stalls themselves, lunches and other refreshments, and the raffle with the first prize again a magnificent quilt kindly donated by the Quilters Group who use the hall throughout the year. This year the arts and crafts side is being organised by Sandy Hanson who has kindly taken over responsibility from Margaret Hill to whom we are most grateful for all she has done and continues to do in, for example, masterminding the making of the quilt. Cynthia Stuart continues to take overall responsibility for refreshments, and the hall's treasurer, Edna

Thompson nobly continues to see that all financial aspects of the Exhibition run smoothly. Please support the Exhibition and encourage friends and visitors to attend the Exhibition which runs from 11am to 5pm each day.

In the light of the very successful rebuilding of the kitchen and toilets and refurbishment of other parts of the Hall, completed in March 2010, the Hall Committee has been looking at a number of aspects of the management of the Hall. In particular it has been looking at the Hall's charges and at ways of further enhancing the Hall to improve the overall experience of those who use the Hall and to ensure its long term viability.

The charges the Hall makes are very low indeed and have not changed since at least 2001 – possibly longer than that but I have a document dated 2001 which sets out the charges then. Since 2001, the costs of virtually everything, but particularly oil and electricity, have risen sharply. The monthly direct debit for electricity, for example, has doubled in the last few years alone. More and more, users of the Hall have been subsidised by fund raising events or through things like the 100 Club Lottery. Increased use of the Hall following the building work has helped raise revenue from hirers although there is still a significant gap between income from users and the day-to-day costs of running the Hall. But there is a dilemma. The Hall is a marvellous community facility that needs to be used. If charges increase too much, the Hall will not be used so much and a spiral of decline might set in. However, it is bad practice to subsidise users from the proceeds of events and activities which should be used to enhance the Hall and secure its long term future. So, what is the way forward? The Hall Committee believes there are two ways forward.

LEE MEMORIAL HALL UPDATE CONTD.

One is to continue the practice that users and groups who come from the village itself are charged half the fee of other users but that there should be a modest increase in charges from 1 January 2014, the first for at least 13 years. From that date, the charge for a person from the village hiring the Hall will rise to £15 per session, a session being a morning, afternoon or evening. The equivalent charge for a booking from someone outside the village will be £30. However, above all else, we do not want to lose any existing regular users who are vital for the Hall and for the village community. So, over the next few months, I shall have a discussion with each regular user with a view to coming to a realistic and honest assessment of what that group or organisation can reasonably afford. The expectation will be that £15 a session is realistic and reasonable. However, if it is clear that £15 a session would cause genuine difficulties and might jeopardise the future of the group, I hope we can come to a mutual agreement of what is affordable and reasonable. This is only a summary of the charges. Other charges apply for events like wedding receptions and use of the hall by commercial organisations. Full details will be available in due cause, but the Hall Committee has wanted to give six months' notice of the new charges.



The second way forward is to further enhance the Hall to improve users' experience of the Hall that encourages its use, and to reduce running costs that will help to keep hiring charges as low as possible. It is quite clear that the main problems, because the main hall has no insulation at all, are the coldness at the beginning of bookings and the time it takes to get the building to an acceptable temperature unless the heating is turned on several hours beforehand. If we can resolve these problems, not only will users have a better experience but, by reducing energy costs, we shall also be lowering the Hall's carbon footprint. Exact details of what we propose to do are still to be final-


ised, but the plans have two essential elements.

Firstly, comprehensive insulation of the main hall to at least the same standards of the new buildings and, secondly, a heating package designed to keep the hall at a pleasant ambient temperature throughout the year which can be boosted if necessary to quickly raise the temperature further. As well as improving users' experiences, keeping the hall at a constant temperature will help the fabric of the building. It should reduce maintenance costs of the building which celebrates its 90th birthday in August this year. At present, I am applying for grants for this work which I hope will be successful. If they are and we can proceed, the scheme will not require any further fund raising nor draw on the Hall's day-to-day revenue accounts. It will be funded from a modest contribution from the Hall's reserves and from grants that are being applied for. The Hall Committee believes that this phase 2 of the development project will complement very well the major work of phase 1 in 2009/10. If and when we are able to proceed, full details will be published.

The next Agnostics Anonymous meeting is on 17th June, a humorous and enjoyable gathering led by Giles King-Smith. All are welcome.


Our wine-loving residents and home owners in the village appreciate the delicious and deep-flavoured wines stocked at the Grampus, thanks to our friend

Whilst prowling near the Bannister's house For rotund vole or long-tailed mouse A disturbance & a "Hand's-up " call Made me jump upon the wall.


And there before my eyes to see

Nick William's, the local farmer's life.


Just then Hilda, my adopted Gran Emerges from the library van. Smartly dressed, eyes blue & misty, Clutched under arm, her Agatha Christie.
