

Thanks also to Cynthia Stuart who organises the refreshments for the period which is no mean feat.

LEE SPRING FAIR REPORT

The best of village life in North Devon was on show this Bank Holiday Monday at the traditional Lee Spring Fair. Sixty two people came together to put on one of the best fairs yet.

Preparations began in the preceding weeks with Pixie Meadow being cut and prepared and Lee Memorial Hall being spring cleaned.

A working party of villagers set to work on the Saturday, pitching marquees and gazebos and stringing the area with an extravagance of bunting; ovens working overtime to bake all the scones and cakes necessary for a true Devon fair.

The stage had been set for a wonderful afternoon and on Monday the weather was perfect - not too hot and sunny to attract people to the beach but not too cold and rainy causing people to stay inside.

The day was more successful than could ever have been anticipated. Admissions were at a record high of about 400 adults and 50 children, plus an assortment of little children who enter free of charge. The number of dogs wasn't recorded, but possibly 30-40 would be an accurate estimate! (Homemade dog biscuits were available from the cake stall at 20p a biscuit!)







LEE SPRING FAIR REPORT, CONTD.

Crowds of people came for refreshments in the Memorial Hall, eating over one hundred cream teas, leaving the kitchen clean out of scones. They came for traditional games: hoopla, penalty goal, horseshoe throwing, coconut shy (50 coconuts were won in just 2 hours!). The cake stall sold out, the bookstall sold a record number of over 200 books and 'Homespun' set up a stall selling unique home-sewn crafts and clothes. There was a BBQ ticking over, welly wanging and - as this year's theme was "a celebration of all things farming" - a vintage tractor parked on site for the children to sit on.

The atmosphere was one of happiness and holidays helped by children entertaining the crowds, playing the guitar with their teacher Joe Steer, by the announcements of the Ilfracombe Town Crier and the presence of the Ilfracombe Mayor.

Well over £3000 was raised this year, which was split two thirds to the Lee Memorial Hall and one third to St Matthew's Church, Lee.

Preparations are already underway for next year's Lee Spring Fair, to be held on Monday 30 May 2016. Village life in North Devon at its very best; fun, friendship and fundraising!

LEE & LINCOMBE RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION

The Lee & Lincombe Residents' Association (LLRA) had its AGM on Wednesday 20 May in Lee Memorial Hall at 7.30pm. The meeting was well attended with around 50 residents turning out, the main topic being the proposals by Acorn Blue for the Lee Bay Hotel re-development. It will be putting in a planning application very soon to the Ilfracombe Town Council (ITC) and also to the North Devon District Council (NDDC) Planning Department. The Residents' Association will also get to inspect these plans at the same time as the ITC. We will only have 21 days to give our views or to write to NDDC with any objections or concerns. Some of the Residents' Association committee members will be attending a meeting at the offices of Acorn Blue in Newquay on Wednesday 3 June to put any concerns which we may have in the village. The members attending this meeting will be myself, Ron Stamp (our new Town Councillor), Elizabeth Gilliat and Mavis Rogers. Elizabeth and Mavis know a great deal about the hotel site and the village.

As you all know, the Residents' Association carried out a survey of views throughout the village of all the residents and holiday owners in Lee and Lincombe. These results were sent to Mr David Higgins, the owner, and to Duncan Powell representing Acorn Blue, the developers, so we will have to see if they have taken these on board and given consideration to these views and are prepared to give something back to the village we all love.

After the meeting in Newquay, we will report back to you all through the LLRA website, maintained by Gina-Luisa and The Fuchsia List that goes out from Ian and Gina-Luisa. I also forgot to mention Gina-Luisa at the AGM, who is the online co-ordinator for the LLRA. Gina-Luisa does a fantastic job all year round for the Residents' Association. We thank you Gina for all your work, you are wonderful and I don't know what we would do without you.

The LLRA will keep you up to date with anything that happens. That's all from me for now and we look forward to reporting back as soon as we have any further information.

Born in 1960 to parents Ron and Sheila, with a younger sister, Jackie, Keith was brought up in Wrafton where he lived mainly with this grandparents, spending much of his youth messing about in boats and helping out the salmon fishermen. Later in life Keith would introduce his children, grandchildren and friends to the estuary with long walks through the dunes to collect crabs for bait, which he would use to fish for bass.

He started his working life as a trainee green keeper at Saunton Golf Club and then went on to be a trawlerman. Keith began his building career as a plasterer's labourer and as the years passed he added many other trades such as window fitting to become the fully skilled builder that he was.

In 1989 Keith met his wife, Julie, and between 1985 and 1992 they had three sons, Ross, Robbie and Jonathan. He built both his first and second family homes in West Down.


After divorcing his wife in 2000 he moved to Lee, buying the building plot that was eventually to be known as Sunsets. After a long and complicated planning application he built an Eco earth shelter that he had designed himself.

Keith was very much a perfectionist and would always do everything to the highest possible standard. A keen inventor, he would often come up with solutions to problems that no one else realised existed in the first place. Keith was at his happiest when he was working and spent many hours at the drawing board to perfect his designs for affordable homes which he had succeeded to just get off the ground as his company, TripleSB.

I joined Keith at Sunsets in 2012 and although we had a relatively short time together we shared many good times. Keith died on 22 February and he will be dearly missed by both myself, his family and friends.

Dennis was the second child in a family of 6 children and he was the only boy. He grew up in Pilton and had a wonderful childhood playing in the fields around. Once, during the war, the Police were involved when the boys lit a fire and their make-shift tent caught alight during the war blackout!

He was a good swimmer as a result of swimming behind barges going down the River Taw. All in all his childhood was idyllic. At the age of 11, he went to Barnstaple Grammar School and later into the Army for National Service.

After the Army he worked on the railway, like his father, for a while before joining SWEB in Barnstaple. He stayed with SWEB for many years only leaving when his first marriage broke up and he went to London to live and work.

He really enjoyed working in London and eventually I went up to join him. He had worked for a while with Motability when it was first set up, but his longest employment was in the wages department of the Park Lane Hotel. When the Hotel changed hands, the new owners 'retired' Dennis — much to his annoyance — he was in his early 70s then!

I can honestly say that our marriage was never dull – sometimes good, sometimes not so good – but I shall always miss him.

Her mother worked with unmarried mothers and her father was a local journalist; sadly he was killed in a motorbike accident when she was still young. She had an older sister called Valerie, who now lives in the Lake District. During the war years she often visited North Devon, and her love of the area and its beauty brought her great pleasure.

During the early 60s Adrienne worked in the West End as a lighting director and stage manager, working with many famous people including Frankie Howerd, Patricia Routledge and many of the 'Carry On' team. She loved every minute of this experience and often talked about her adventures.


On moving to North Devon she met and married Richard Howard on 16 April 1964 in St. Matthew's Church, Lee. They had two children Nicol and Martyn. Sadly Nicol died in 2014. Prior to living in Lee they ran a grocery shop in Bideford called 'Howard's Corner Store'. When the family moved to Meadowside in Lee, Adrienne worked in the Beach Gift Shop for a number of years before running the Old School Room as a gift shop. She played an active part in village life by organising and directing village plays in the Memorial Hall, being responsible for organising the Wednesday morning service in the Church and was the Secretary of Lee and Lincombe Residents' Association for many years. This consumed many hours of her time attending meetings and making sure all matters were dealt with in due time. In recent years, on Sundays, she looked after St. Nicholas Chapel in Ilfracombe for the Rotary Club. Adrienne loved all animals and, as all her friends know, she was particularly devoted to her sheep.

More recently she spent her time as a devoted carer, looking after her husband Richard, latterly ably helped by her son, Martyn. She was a silent saint quietly undertaking her complex family duties always with a smile and a caring word to others.

Adrienne died on Sunday 19 April. We will miss her greatly, but she still lives on in our hearts.

MINI MONSTERS PARENT & TODDLER GROUP




