

NEWS FROM ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH

As usual, the summer has seen many visitors to the church with frequent comments in the visitors' book about the church's charm and peacefulness. It is good that the church is open thanks to Louise who opens the church whenever her gallery and craft shop is open.

The Harvest Festival service and supper were very successful. The large congregation of over 70, including the choir and many young people, enjoyed a lively service with Geoff Hills' talk being a particular highlight. His interpretation of the story of the Good Samaritan using green, red and yellow peppers will be long remembered!

I am writing these notes at the end of September, but, by the time they are read, two important events will have started. On Sunday 9 October, at the usual service time of 8.45 am, the first of our monthly 'All-Age' service will have taken place. As its name implies, it aims to provide something new for everyone. Its style is relatively informal in straightforward language to appeal to younger people but with a firm structure and much substance to appeal to all ages. Each month there will be a theme to the service. The theme of the first service was

'Friendship and Marriage'. The second of these monthly services will be on Remembrance Sunday (November 13) so the theme will be 'Remembrance'. Everyone is most welcome to these services which will be on the second Sunday of each month. They will be followed by tea, coffee and soft drinks in the Memorial Hall. The regular communion service will, of course, continue on other Sundays at 8.45 am. After the service on Remembrance Sunday, there will be an Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial, including the reading of the names of those from the village who gave their lives in both world wars and two minutes' silence. It is always a moving occasion when traffic stops on the road and the valley is still.

The second event is the implementation of the new lighting and heating scheme for the church. I have referred in previous editions of the News of the Church Council's wish to replace the old fashioned and uninspiring lighting and heating with a lighting scheme that enhances the ambience of the church and a heating scheme that provides an evenly warm church throughout the winter. The Diocese of Exeter has now approved the scheme which will permit attractive variations in the lighting and the highlighting of key features. The ugly and intrusive

heaters are being replaced by neat underpew heaters which will give off an even heat at ground level which should warm feet rather than heads! Work should have started at the beginning of October and should be completed, apart from some necessary redecoration, by the end of October.

Thoughts will soon be turning to Christmas when there will be the usual village Carol Service and the Christmas Communion service. The village Carol Service will be on Monday 19 December at 6.30 pm, followed by seasonal refreshments in the Memorial Hall, and the Christmas Eve service, with the singing led by the choir, will be at its usual time of 10.00 pm, this year on Sunday 24 December. However, before the main Christmas events, St Matthew's is very pleased to be the venue on two other occasions. On Sunday 4 December at 7.30 pm, Beaford Arts is

promoting 'Black Voices'. There is extensive publicity around the village, but, to quote some of the publicity, Black Voices are 'simply the most exciting and finest exponents of female acappella singing'. For further information and tickets, contact Kate Madden on 01271 865591. Then on Monday 12 December, North Devon Hospice will hold one of its 'Light up a Light' services in the church at 6.30 pm, followed by refreshments in the Memorial Hall. Each year, the Hospice holds a number of similar services around North Devon to provide opportunities for anyone to remember loved ones and to light a candle in their memory. The Hospice cordially invites you to this short and simple service.

Many holidays were spent up above Ivy Bank, sometimes we would take the cottage as well, happy if what sometimes were damp times, June being a favorite for the most rainy of holidays. Each time we would arrive to be greeted by Mrs Race who would break herself away from the tennis to relate to us that the previous week had been gorgeous. Hasten to say the following week the precipitation was in abundance.

1991 was one such damp year, having got married on the longest day June 21st, I hastily rang the Post Office in Lee for any accommodation which could be booked, finally we managed to book in at The Old Vicarage, which then did bed and breakfast, that year was the first when Wimbledon was played on the middle Sunday, which came to be known as people's Sunday. The sound of Annie Lennox could be heard from the car tape, "Here Comes The Rain Again".

All this leads me onto the fact that this year was our Silver Wedding Anniversary, all plans for the yearly pilgrimage were blown apart by Jackie's unfortunate stay in hospital at the beginning of the year. Not knowing the outcome and life limitations that we would be faced with we have had a Summer of adapting to our new life.

We have greatly missed our trip, over the years we have arrived with our dogs, initially our Red Setter and all our other dogs over the years have enjoyed the bay, three Cavaliers and now our Border Terrier, "Alfie".

For self catering reasons and also our dog and dogs, the accommodation we have stayed in has been always fantastic. From those early days at The Chalets and Woodstock, to the holiday lets where the tea rooms were to one year at Summer Haze. Then in about 2005 we took "Brookdale" for sometimes two weeks and if I recall occasionally three weeks split outside of the school holidays.

As with all good things, they come to an end. In search of other accommodation we found a nice idyllic spot, one year Damage Hue and then for the last three years "The Blue Mushroom".

So, all in all, we have had - over the last 27 years - great times, most of the time spent talking with people, enjoying the various guises that the Grampus has been, seen the hotel open then close then open and now left abandoned.

Evenings spent with Bob and Elizabeth at the Old Post Office are fond memories. Trips to Squires and seeing the changes in Lee and beyond always made us smile. Verity and the changing appearance of Ilfracombe. The Harvest Festivals, hog roasts and ferret racing amongst other village activities. Our visits back to Brookdale to see Alan and Margaret when we were staying in Lee were always looked forward to.


There are many ways to skin a rabbit, we are making small steps and larger strides are happening.

Another "first" from Louis' wine list - a Pinot Noir, again from the Finger Lakes area of the USA from the Forge winery. The Coravin Sytem used in The Grampus enables customers to sample any of Louis' superb wines without having to buy a whole bottle until they know which delicious one to choose. For those who haven't seen it in action, the Coravin apparatus inserts a hypodermic needle through the cork, inert gas is pumped into the bottle as the wine flows out into your glass. As the wine in the bottle is not exposed to air by this method, it is unaffected by it.

Specials on the menu at the moment are Lamb Tagine, Smoked Haddock & Plaistow Trout Chowder & Clam Chowder. From our inspirational Mexican cook, Yvi, comes Chilli Con Carne, Guacamole, & Mexican Flan.

Soon we shall be welcoming back Helen, another enthusiastic cook who is already dreaming up new specials, especially desserts, with which to tempt you.

Friday Music Nights are always very popular and we have amazing stories of the distance some folk travel to join us.

LEE MEMORIAL HALL UPDATE



Our village hall has been used extensively throughout the summer months with the usual regular bookings drawing to a close during July, followed by the annual Lee Village Flower Show and the Arts and Crafts fair.

Once again we had a very successful Arts and Crafts Fair during August with a wonderful and colourful display of many different crafts. These included beautiful handmade glass decorations, wonderful felt pictures, exquisite needlework and patchwork, handmade cards, cushions, tea light holders created from old wooden barrels and sweet smelling soaps as well as delightful artwork all created by local artists. A lovely patchwork quilt created by the Fuchsia Valley Quilters was the first prize in the raffle and there were other prizes kindly donated by local people. Delicious refreshments were on offer every day throughout the fair which involved a great many helpers who gave their time to bake scrumptious home made cakes as well as helping in the kitchen.

The fair was well attended with 1868 visitors raising £3,939 for the hall funds — a fantastic result! In addition Margaret Hill has very generously donated the proceeds of all of her beautiful patchwork and quilts towards the purchase of a new piano for the hall so a special thank you to Margaret. Also a huge thank you to everyone who contributed towards the

success of this annual event, the visitors, the crafters, the cooks, the kitchen helpers and those who were involved in the organisation — we are very grateful to you all for all of your hard work in making this another wonderful fair. A selection of photographs from the fair appear opposite.

Over the summer we have started to use the resource group from Ilfracombe that have been looking after the church grounds, to help with the gardening jobs at the hall and meadow. We've had a couple of sessions so far and noticed the improvements.

Recently the hall was the venue for another lovely supper after the Harvest Festival, the food being sourced from predominately local providers.

During the summer the hall has staged a summer ceilidh with M'Larkey, been used as a polling station for the EU referendum, a number of meetings and parties and a wedding reception.

A small theatre company is putting on an interactive play on November 19th. For more details please see the entry from the Lee Village Arts Group.

Very recently we have had it confirmed that the hall has passed its renewal of the Hallmark 2 check, which is a quality standard for Devon's community buildings. A new certificate will be displayed shortly.

Help was required to stop this giant, which had to be cut down to get it out! They received a very nice bottle of wine for all their efforts, and we mustn't forget to mention Pat and Ged coming second with a hefty 9ft 7ins, only 3ins in it.

Autumn seems to be jumping upon us all too quickly with leaves dropping from the trees and our gardens needing a really good tidy up, so tips from the RHS this month:

- 1. Divide herbaceous perennials
- 2. Pick Autumn raspberries
- 3. Collect and sow seed from perennials and hardy annuals
- 4. Dig up remaining potatoes before slug damage spoils them
- 5. Net ponds before leaf fall gets underway
- 6. Keep up with watering of new plants, using rain or grey water if possible
- 7. Start to reduce the frequency of house plant watering
- 8. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so that they are ready for use in the autumn
- 9. Cover leafy vegetables with bird proof netting
- 10. Plant spring flowering bulbs

Our next event will be the Coffee Morning in May next year, so please look out for that date, always nice to catch up with friends to have a natter and put the world to rights. Remember to put out your bird feeders for the winter. Enjoy the photographs opposite - taken by Edna Thompson and me. Until next time.

Your NHW is alive and well, and seeks your continued support. Our remit is to look out for each other to keep the villages safe. The coordinators are Paul Scarrott (864723), Ian Stuart

(863396), and Mavis Rogers (862947).


Update: Crime and antisocial behaviour remain low. Over the last 12 months there have been reports of: thefts from the beach, burglary of tools and equipment from outbuildings, criminal damage to building furniture, noisy parties/music, fly tipping and identity fraud. We will let you know via the Fuchsia List if anything happens, and provide advice when it does.

Police: We maintain a good working relationship with the Ilfracombe West Neighbourhood Policing Team. They have patrolled in response to incidents, updated us on crime trends, and held a joint exercise in Lee; in return we provide information and assisted with the filming of a documentary on Coastal Policing.

Crime Prevention: Please lock outbuildings where tools or other valuables are stored; install security lighting at vulnerable sites; mark your tools with the post code in indelible ink. Incidents can be reported to Crimestoppers, 101, the Neighbourhood Police Team, NHW and 999 (in emergency). Don't be a victim to cybercrime and never give your personal and bank details away over the phone. We will fix new NHW signs in Lincombe and in Home Lane.

Your role: there is one road in and out of Lee and Lincombe, so your eyes and ears are crucial in stopping and spotting criminals. So, if you see something report it, record it, and let your NHW know as appropriate. Remember to use the modern technology we all have at our disposal — the mobile phone with camera and video built in.

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
AN EVENING OF THE BLUES - IN AID OF SYRIAN REFUGEES


