It is good to welcome some newcomers to the village. We are also sad to say farewell to a distinguished and well-known person who lived his entire life in the village until moving to Tyspane Nursing Home a number of years ago.

Patrick and Deb Conner have moved into the main wing of The Grange. They say they are very happy to have become part of the Grange community, having taken over the side of the Grange occupied for many years by John and Romy Walker.

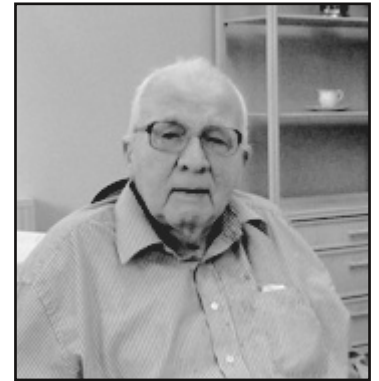
Henry and Kate Robson with young Matilda have moved to Greystones for 18 months. They say that they have moved from Shepherd's Bush in London for a better quality of life with two young ones. Matilda is 18 months and another one is due this month!

Ken Baker. Ken died on 22 October 2018 with his funeral on 13 November. Ken's son, Laurence and his wife, Miriam, have kindly provided information about Ken's life on which the following obituary is based.

George Kenneth was born to George and Jesse Baker on 27 October 1925 at Warcombe Farm. He went to Lee village school then on to senior school which is now the infants' school in Ilfracombe. He used to tell about having to deliver milk with his parents before going to school. They used a horse and cart with a churn, and the milk was ladled into the jugs that people brought out to them.

He started seeing Lil through the Young Farmers club and would walk, cycle or ride his horse to visit her in Spreacombe. They married on 20 October 1948 at Woolacombe Methodist church and lived in a cottage in Higher Slade. In 1951 they built Meadowdene in Lincombe, changing over with his parents to Lincombe Farmhouse (now Lincombe House) in the mid-60s.

They sold the farmhouse in 1977 to build Bakers Lincombe Farm Bungalow. In the 1960s Ken and his father were on the board of directors of Ilfracombe dairies which used to be behind Scarlet Pimpernel garage.



Ken was a member of Lee Memorial Hall committee and over the years he worked with the Council with a tractor and loader clearing Lee beach of seaweed left after storms as well as clearing snow and blocked drains. He loved pottering in the greenhouse and there were always flowers in the window at the front of the bungalow. He was a blood donor and earned his gold badge for donating 50 pints. However, he was in and out of hospital himself several times over the years. When he had a hiatus hernia repair, he was smoking heavily. He stopped immediately after seeing the damage it was doing. He also had 4 new hips and a knee and spent the last 9 years, after having a stroke, in Tyspane Nursing Home.

He was brought up going to Lee Methodist church. He then went to Brookdale Church in the late 1970s moving to Encounter Church in 1983. Since his death the family has had many messages of memories of him being caring, kind and going out of his way to help.

NEWS FROM ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH

Christmas seems a long time ago now but I'm pleased to say that the Christmas services were their usual success with the church full for both the Carol Service and the Christmas Eve service. Paul Jagers trained the choir for the Carol Service in his expert way. The choir sang the lovely carol 'The Angel Gabriel' and also an Exmoor version of the 'Holly and the Ivy' accompanied by handbells. After the service, everyone enjoyed refreshments in the Memorial Hall kindly provided by the Hall Committee. The choir also led the singing at the traditional Christmas Eve service.

Last year, for the first time in recent memory, we celebrated Plough Sunday on the second Sunday in January. We did so again this year, coinciding as it does with the monthly all-age service. As well as a procession of Lawrence Wright's old-fashioned plough and milk churn, we were very pleased that David Kennard provided a shepherd's crook to add to the procession. The large congregation enjoyed the service with its focus on the importance of farming.

Easter is 3 weeks later than last year which means that Mothering Sunday is also 3 weeks later, this year on 31 March. As in recent years, it is very much a village occasion, and the ladies choir will again sing an item. Instead of the usual light refreshments after the all-age services, the traditional full breakfast will be served after the service in the Memorial Hall. The service starts at 8.45 am with breakfast at about 9.30.

Everyone is most welcome.

Easter services will follow the usual pattern. On Good Friday 19 April, there is a service at 2.00 pm consisting of a series of readings about Christ's passion and death, interspersed with hymns and periods of silence. Although we call the service 'The Last Hour' in memory of the last hour of Christ's life on the cross, it only lasts about 50 minutes!

On Easter Sunday 21 April at 9.00 am, we celebrate with a festival Easter Communion service, with the singing of traditional Easter hymns led by the choir. As always, everyone is most welcome to this and other services. Then on Easter Monday morning, starting at 10.30 am in the Memorial Hall, there will be a Coffee Morning with Hot Cross Buns and delicious cakes, and some activities for children. This is always a popular event, so do come along.

Soon after Easter, on Tuesday 30 April, the annual meeting of the church takes place when the Annual Report and Accounts are presented. It is called the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). The accounts for 2018 have already come back from the Independent Examiner and they appear to be fine! The business also includes the election of Churchwardens and other officers. The meeting is open to all residents of the parish and others who are on the Electoral Roll, though only those on the Electoral Roll are able to vote.

Early in December the W.I. held their annual Candlelit supper and following the Carol Service everyone piled into the hall for mulled wine and tasty Christmas treats.

In early January we were pleased to see lots of villagers

helping with the annual Fuchsia hedge cutting. It was a successful morning followed by more mulled wine, mince pies and stollen.

More recently the hall was used for some Devon County Council seminars, with the organisers based in Exeter.

Sarah McQuaid, a critically acclaimed folk singer will be performing on 21 February, courtesy of Beaford Arts.

As previously mentioned, Paul Jagers has a concert on 23 February and, on 24 February, Joe Steer is running a kids music workshop from 10am.

59% of all fatalities occur on country roads. These roads often have sharp bends, blind bends and unexpected hazards so brake before the bend to give yourself time to react and stay in control.

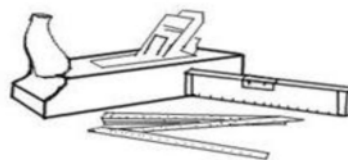
Three people die each day on average on country roads.

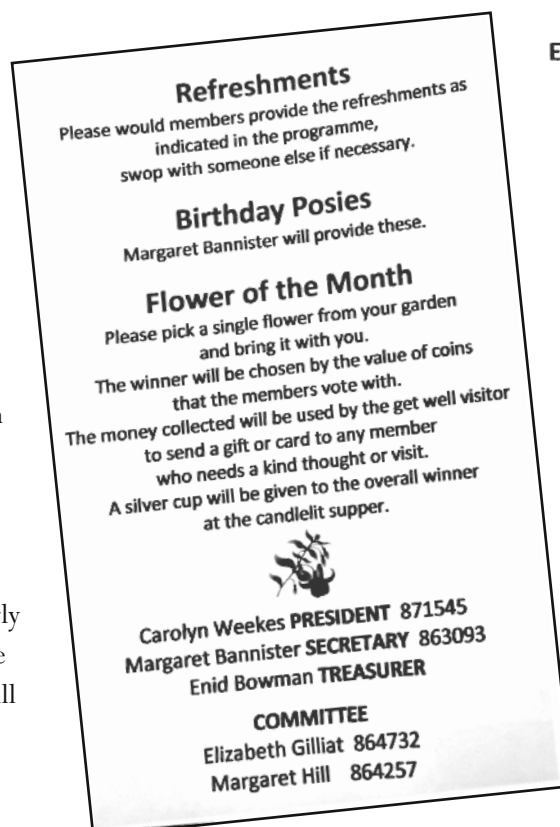
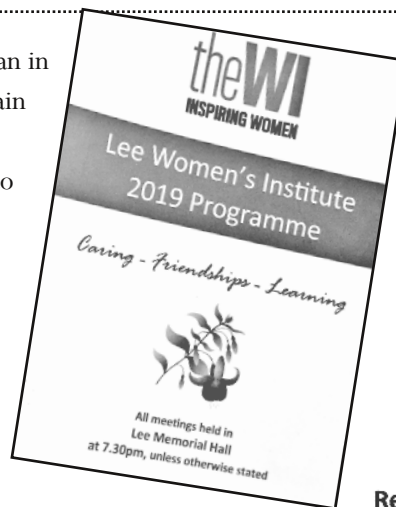
The WI is based on the ideals of fellowship, truth, tolerance and justice. The organization is non-sectarian and non party political.

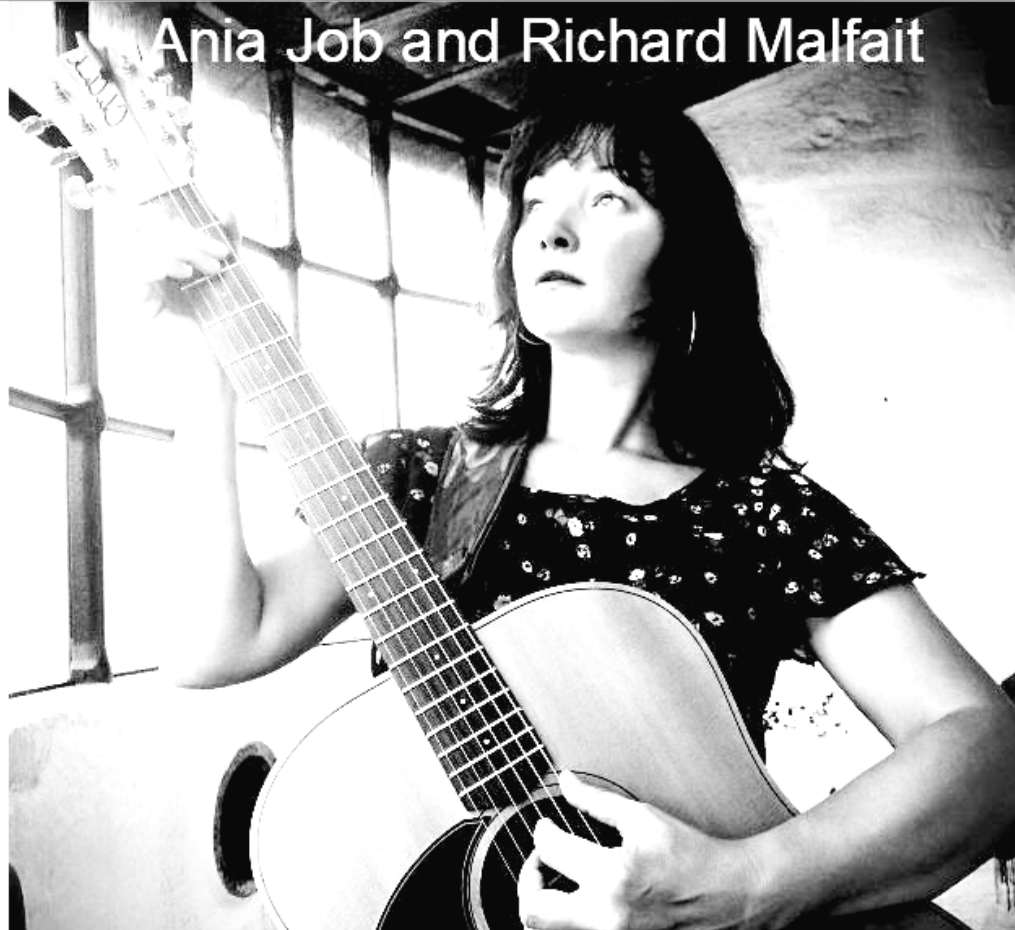

SPOTLIGHT ON LARA CONLEY

Lara Conley will be performing her first solo concert of 2019 in Lee Village Hall this month.

Recently interviewed for a live show on Balcony TV Exeter, Lara Conley is a powerful singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist and one of few female artists to use an Irish Bodhran as a singing accompaniment. An evocative and expressive vocalist, Lara's style falls into folk and world music categories, with early inspiration gained from artists Tracy Chapman, Bjork and Joni Mitchell as well and more recent influences of traditional British folk music, Celtic musicians and fusion singers such as Sheila Chandra. Lara captivates her audiences with a warmth and honesty which makes you feel like you are in a cosy living room. Her compositions travel through stories, tradition, life experience and protests, all compiled into simple, stylish songs. She often encourages her audience to sing along and accompanies herself with guitar, bodhran and Drurotrigue dulcimer.

Lara's music has previously had airplay on Folk Radio, BBC Radio Devon and BBC Gloucestershire, she has featured in Acoustic Magazine and performed throughout the UK at festivals, as well as touring Morocco in 2017. Lara's music has also been used for film, including most recently 'The Space Outside' by local film maker Jessica Pearson.

Lara will be sharing songs from her most recent album Wild Water, material from previous duo The Alchemist's Wardrobe and a selection of pieces from her upcoming acoustic solo album. There will also be an opportunity to experience songs written for her new weekly group 'Singing Circle' which is

held in Appledore, and future singing projects that support local charity NDADA.

Lara's musical career began in Exmouth Devon, where she was inspired and supported by artists on the local music scene. It was there that Lara made her first recordings and live performances. The most influential artist at the time and continuing throughout Lara's career was the much admired Didgeridoo player and world musician Richard Bridge, an exceptional talent and very dear friend, to whom this concert will be dedicated.

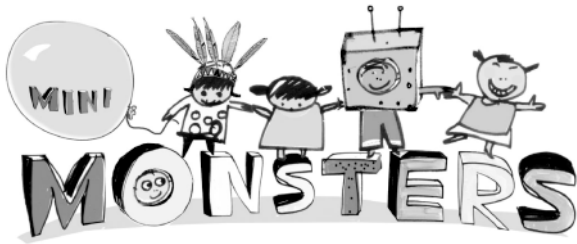

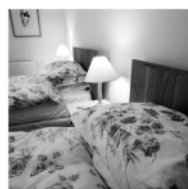

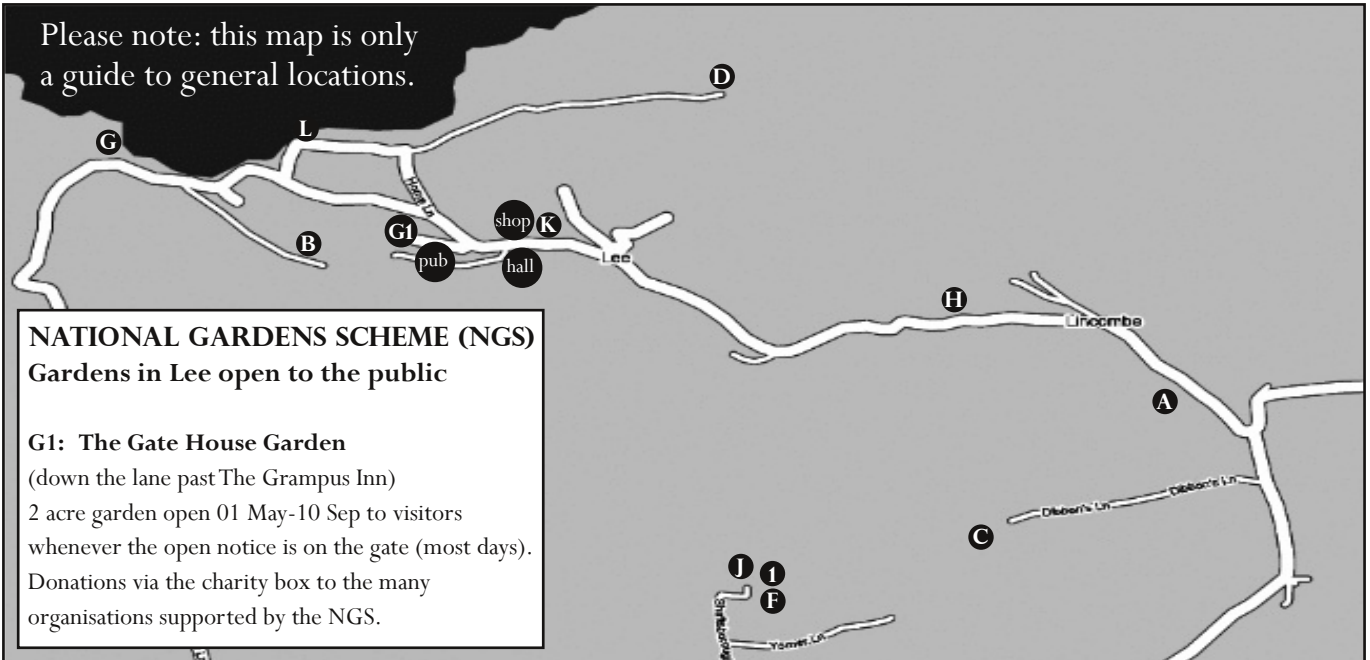
